WEISNER AWARDED MATH FELLOWSHIP AT HARVARD

To Begin Work in September
on Invariant Theory of
Plane Polygons

Dr. Louis Weisner, instructor in the mathematics department has been awarded a National Research Fellowship in Mathematics by the National Research Council, and will begin his work early in September at Harvard University. The subject of his work will be "The Invariant Theory of Plane Polygons."

The National Research Fellowship, which are awarded by the Research Fellowship Board of the National Research Council, are given to persons who have demonstrated a high order of ability in research, for the purpose of enabling them to conduct investigations at educational institutions which make adequate provision for effective prosecution of research.

Dr. Weisner has been instructor here for the past three years, and has published several articles of mathematical research in The Bulletin of the American Mathematical Societies, The American Mathematical Monthly, and The American Journal of Mathematics. He is a graduate of the City College of New York, and received his degrees of Master of Arts and Doctor of Philosophy from Columbia University.
